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Setting Up a POP Email Account

1. Tap the Settings icon.



- 2. Tap Mail, Contacts, Calendars.
- 3. Tap Add Account.
- 4. Tap Other, located at the bottom of the list.
- 5. Enter the following information in the spaces provided:
 - Name—Enter your full first and last name, as you want it to be displayed in the email you send.
 - Address—Enter your entire email address (e.g., myname@mydomain.com).
 - · Password—Enter your email account password.
 - Description—Enter a descriptive name for your account (e.g., My Work Account). This description will be visible only to you.
- 6. Tap the Save button.
- On the next screen, select POP on the IMAP / POP button. In both the Incoming Mail Server and Outgoing Mail Server sections, enter the following information:
 - Host Name—Enter the name of the secure email server: secure.emailsrvr.com
 - User Name—Enter your entire email address (e.g., myname@mydomain.com).
 - Password—Enter the password associated with your email account.
- 8. Tap the Save button.

- 9. You will be returned to the Mail, Contacts, Calendars screen. A POP email connection will normally delete messages from the server after download; however, by default the iPhone will leave copies on the server. This allows you to access these messages through other email clients. To change this setting, tap the name of the account you just created.
- Scroll to the bottom of the screen, and tap the Advanced button.
- 11. Tap Delete from server.
- 12. Tap a selection based on whether messages should be removed from the server: never, after seven days, or when removed from your inbox.



13. After completing these steps, you should be able to send and receive email successfully.

Using SSL (Secure Sockets Layer)

The iPhone turns on SSL by default. SSL provides additional security to your email communication. SSL encrypts your messages between your email client and our servers. SSL is optional. The addresses provided will work without SSL turned on. If you decide not to use SSL, please change your incoming server port to 110 and the outgoing server port to 587 or 8025.

Comparing POP and IMAP

POP

- Best when you will be primarily accessing your email from a single location, like your office or home. When you leave your office or home, you can still access your email from a web browser.
- Messages are downloaded to your computer, so you don't need to worry about exceeding the size of your mailbox.
- When accessing your email account through a web browser, you may not see previous messages that were downloaded to your desktop email client.

IMAP

- Best when you will be accessing your email from multiple locations.
- Allows you to create portable folders. These folders
 will appear in each email client you use to access your
 account. Your account will look the same at work, at home,
 and at your friend's house.
- Because your email messages are stored on the server, you must monitor your mailbox size and delete messages to avoid exceeding your mailbox size.
